This turned out to be a wise decision, in that, I brought it home and played with it for a few days, and although calibration is not the answer, there are a lot of ways to adjust our old XP, Vista, era projector to give us, hopefully, a better picture on the screen than we have been having. This is certainly worth giving it a try. Let us know if you think the pictures are better... or if you have any suggestions, because our business is looking at pictures. Particularly if we are going to ever have "real-time judging" from the screen, we need to accurately project our images.

At an Education Committee meeting, we were talking about putting pictures of people on public media, especially young children. The concept fixed in stone is that if you are getting paid for the picture, like selling it to a magazine, you need to have a proper release. If you are using it personally, like for club activities, you don't need the release. BUT, now that we are entering a lot of outside contests that end up putting winners on their website that has public access, it was suggested that while we probably don't need to be compulsive about releases, we should be constantly aware about the pictures of all people that we are putting out on the cloud for others to see. Comments and opinions appreciated.

At the last meeting **Young McQueen** spoke, and among other things, pointed out a lot of new areas that have opened up on the website. He mentioned the **Clicks Weekly** that **John Neel** is editing and complements the full monthly edition of Clicks. Check this out. It's on the home page under "When," with links to just about all the information that you would want to quickly check out on the website. The programs, outings, competitions....all in one place to keep from having to search for them.

Young mentioned that there are two other areas that are getting popular and are definitely worth checking out, and even adding to with some of your own pictures. Creative Abstracts

You have diligently learned all the rules of photography...or most of them. Now it is time to unlearn them. Our first project for the Creative Photography interest group will be creating abstracts by moving our cameras. Set your ISO low, preferably to 100. Set your shutter speed at 1/10 of a second and choose a subject with some interesting colors or designs. Don't shoot in the bright sun but opt instead for a slightly shaded subject so you don't overexpose your picture. As you hit the button to take your picture, swing your camera to the right. Now take another swinging your camera to the left. Take a third swinging your camera in a circle. Now you can experiment with the shutter speed moving it to 1/2...1...2...3 seconds and see what you get. You can also use your zoom lenses to take interesting abstracts. As you hit the shutter release twist your zoom lens in and out. Try this with varying shutter speeds.

Put Creative Project 1 in the title of the email.

I will put some of the pictures in the next Clicks so we can share our work. Have Fun!



The purpose of starting the LPIG was to teach members about the importance of LIGHT and how to measure and manipulate it in the studio environment. We covered a lot of territory, used a lot of different lights and lighting techniques, had a lot of different members take charge of the evening using their own models, and at least now, there are a lot of JCC members that know more about lighting in a studio than they did.

The learning phase has slowed down and mostly we are gathering just to take pictures, eliminating the need for an organized monthly teaching session. We can still set up the studio and arrange a shoot anytime that anyone has something special that they want to try, or a special model that they were to photograph. The studio is ALWAYS available and Brian or I will be glad to help set up any type of shoot that you want to try, we can do just about anything (see the dance pic)...but nothing will be scheduled anymore. The "ad-lib" shoots can be as private as you like, or we can involve the whole LPIG group...your call.

The graduation exercise, I guess, will be the April 15th JCC outing at my house for portrait shooting. There will be at least three set ups and help if you need it.




